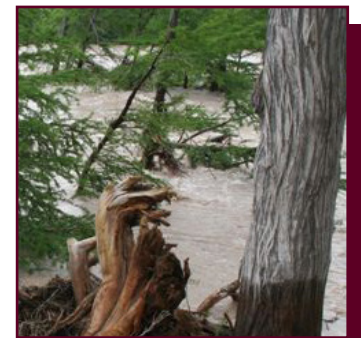
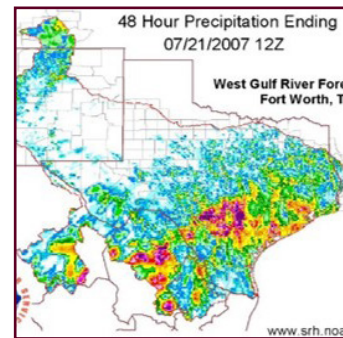
Type - **RAIN**



Beginning July 19, 2007, numerous showers and thunderstorms developed over the Hill Country producing 1 to 2 inches of rain per hour, and in some instances, 3 to 4 inches per hour. Counties affected included Uvalde, Kinney, Medina and Maverick. Due to the large amounts of rain and the continued development of showers and thunderstorms the Uvalde County Judge requested a TX-TF1 ESF-9 Liaison Officer to be staged at the County's Emergency Operations Center on July 21.

The TX-TF1 ESF-9 Liaison Officer was responsible for coordinating any swiftwater rescue efforts as necessary. While the ESF-9 Liaison Officer was en route to the Uvalde County EOC, TX-TF1 activated 2 Water Rescue Squads and put them on standby in Bexar County for any possible swiftwater rescues.

As the day progressed, the rainfall subsided allowing all TX-TF1 personnel to demobilize later that day, with all teams returning home that evening.
